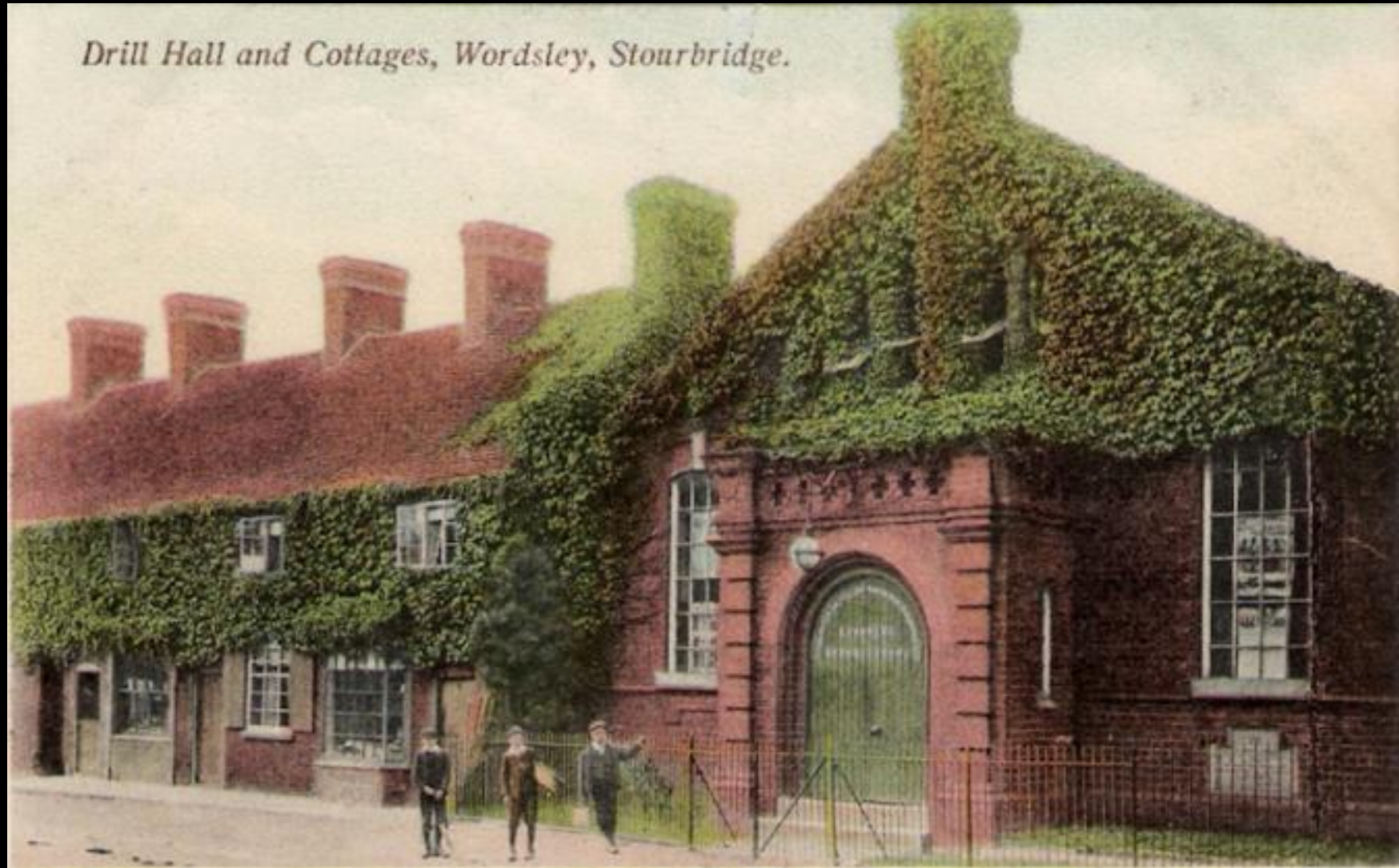

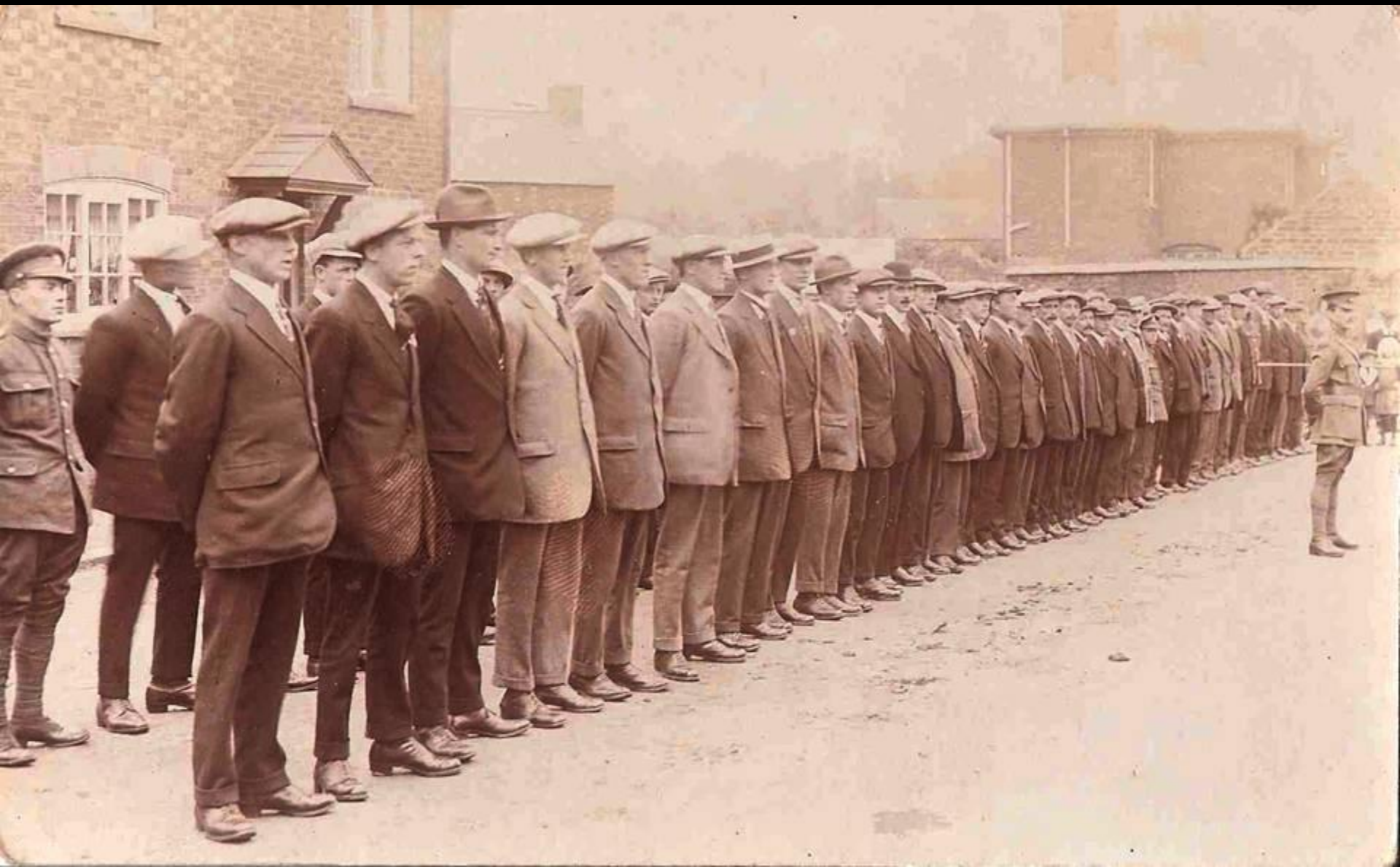

# ZEPPELIN RAID MEMORIAL.



*Press Bureau, OFFICIAL MESSAGE.*

**“Zeppelins visited the Eastern Counties on Tuesday night (17th August, 1915), dropped bombs, resulting in 10 killed and 36 injured. Some houses and other buildings, including a church, were damaged.”**

THE AWARD OF THE VICTORIA CROSS  
TO CAPTAIN ROBINSON WAS FIRST ANNOUNCED  
WHILE LONDON WAS STILL IN SEPTEMBER 1916  
THE MOST CONSPICUOUS DAMAGE  
HE ATTACKED AN ENEMY AIRSHIP  
UNDER CONDITIONS OF GREAT DIFFICULTY  
AND DANGER, AND SENT IT CRASHING  
TO THE GROUND AS A FLAMING WRECK.  
HE HAD BEEN IN THE AIR FOR MORE  
THAN TWO HOURS, AND HAD PREVIOUSLY  
DEFENDED ANOTHER AIRSHIP AGAINST FLIGHT

TO THE MEMORY OF

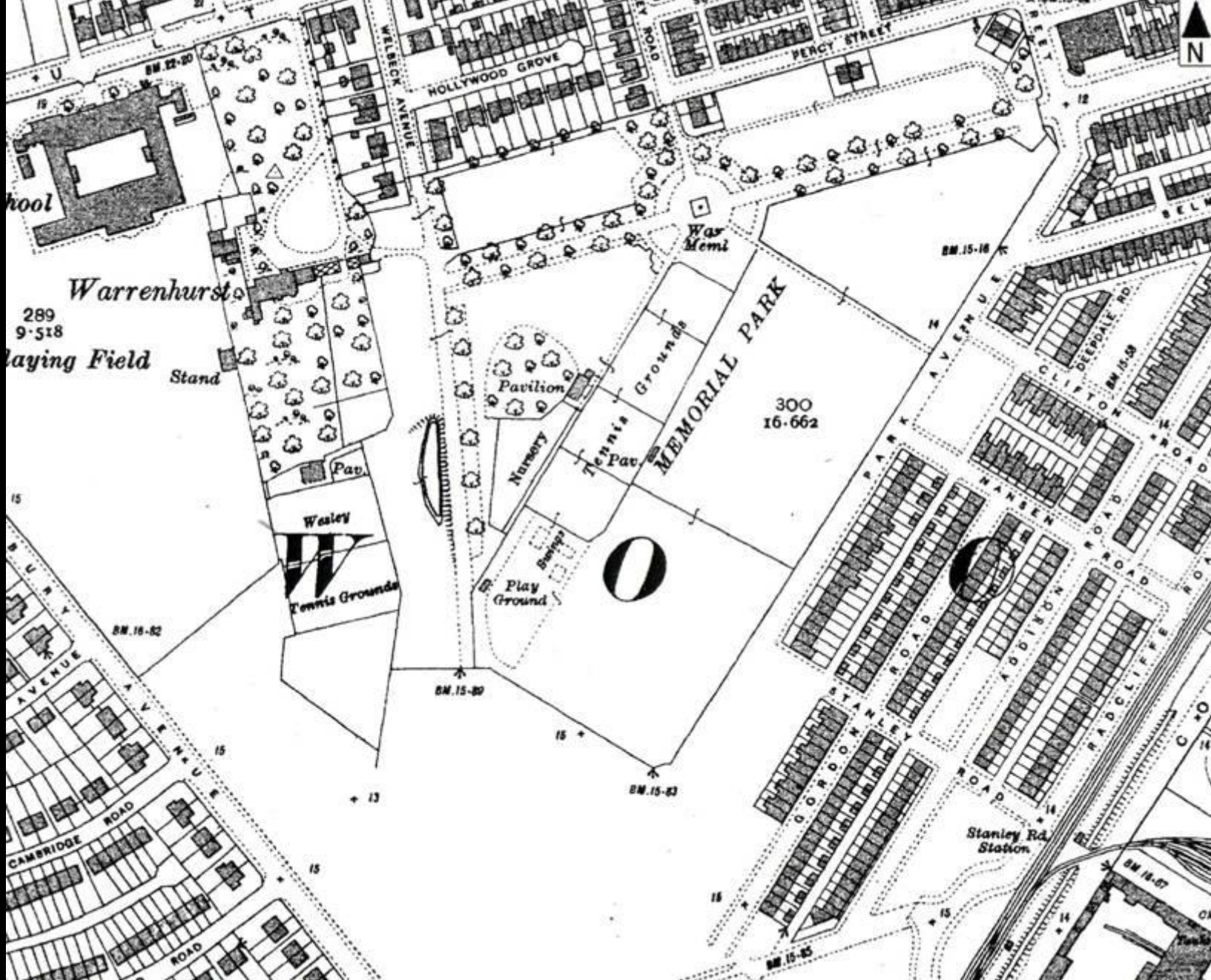

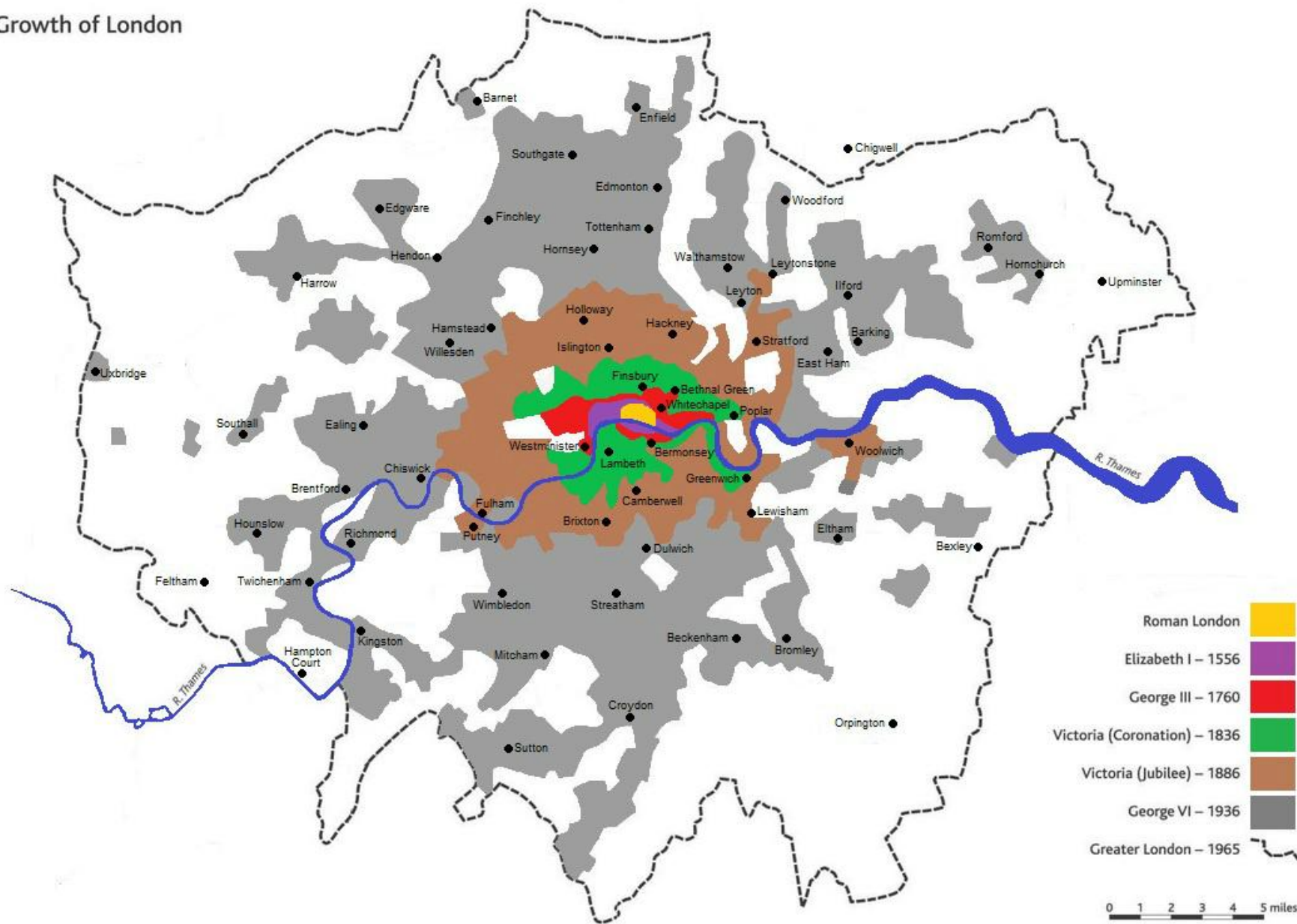
