GOD spake these words,

Lord made heaven and earth, the sea, and
all that in them is, and rested the seventh
day: wherefore the Lord blessed the seventh
day, and hallowed it.
V. Honour thy father and thy mother, that
thy days may be long in the land which the
Lord thy God giveth thee.
VI. Thou shalt do no murder.
VII. Thou shalt not commit adultery.
VIII. Thou shalt not steal.
IX. Thou shalt not bear false witness
against thy neighbour.
X. Thou shalt not covet thy neighbour's
house; thou shalt not covet thy neighbour's
wife, nor his servant, nor his maid, nor his
ox, nor his ass, nor any thing that is his.
















THE ROYAL EXCHANGE as it was Built before the Fire of London
at the sole charge of S^t Thomas Grellam Knight.




This Statue of
S^t Thomas Grellam Knight
Standeth in the
North-West corner of
the Present Royal Exchange
where you see the Letter A.

The Royal Exchange, was erected in 1566, at the sole charge of S^t Tho: Grellam Kn^t, and was burnt down






FIGURE 111 Wingfield Manor: ground plan









GROUNDED PLAN OF GILERTON HOUSE.

| G. Butlers Pantry | O. Scullery. |


















