































# Translating past money

- The average wage in 1660 was about £12-10-0 per year.
- The average wage today is about £27,000 per year
- So average wages today are 2,160 times what they were in 1660.

• If something cost £25 in 1660 - twice the average wage then - we say its equivalent is £54,000 today - twice the average today.
