
The 'Pilgrimage of Grace', 1536




An Elizabethan depiction of Edward VI's Reformation






The Booke of Common Praier (1549)








Reprisals after the south-western rebellion of 1549






Mary I (reigned 1553-8)








Mary I (reigned 1553-8), saviour of English Catholicism The English College at Douai (in the 18th century)

Pope Pius V excommunicates Elizabeth I, 1570












