





Map of the route of Monmouth and his rebel army










Fig. 36 Nos 130 to 133






Fig. 36 Nos 130 to 133













Monmouth House, Soho Square, shown after its façade was remodelled in the 1720s.








Plan of Monmouth House, Soho Square
