


Portrait of Thomas Hurst Benjamin Vandergucht, 1782 The College of Optometrists (BOA Museum)










A look at the stats...


- 22.5 million 18-60 year olds in the UK (65% of this agegroup) wear some form of corrective eyewear.
- 62% of adults living in the UK wear spectacles, whilst only 14% wear contact lenses.













Old Lady with Bonnet and Spectacles Alfred Mudge (floruit.1862-1883)




- Those of Asian and African-Caribbean descent are less likely to wear corrective eyewear than those of white descent.

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














